



PAST SIMPLE (NEGATIVE)




We have discussed the affirmative form of past simple, both regular and irregular verbs.

Today, we will discuss how to create a negative sentence in past simple. We can start with a pronoun, as all regular sentences, they add 'didn't' which is a post modal verbs, and finally, we add main verb, in its infinite form.


I didn't go to work today
They didn't wash the car
She didn't call the police.

Remember that the main verb doesn't suffer any changes

Make	Made




Infinitive	Past simple (irregular)
Sleep	Slept
Take	Took
Wear	Wore
Write	Wrote
Teach	Taught
Tell	Told
Swim	Swam
Sit	Sat





PAST SIMPLE (NEGATIVE)



From affirmative to negative:

1. She played video-games until sunrise → She didn't play video-games until sunrise
 2. They bought a bag of dog food → They didn't buy a bag of food
 3. He taught a really good lesson → He didn't teach a really good lesson
 4. It felt very damaged → It didn't feel very damaged
 5. We swam in the river → We didn't swim in the river
 6. I went to the library to read → I didn't go to the library to read

Cheap - Expensive




Clean - Dirty


Hot - Cold

Tidy - Messy






**THERE WAS AND

We use 'there was' and 'there were' to refer to objects or people in the past tense. We use 'there was' to talk about a singular, and we use 'there were' to refer to plurals.

There was a beautiful dog
There were pencils on the table
There was an owl on the window
There were children at the school




There was a girl
